1	<p><b>I can explain what religion means.</b></p> <p><b>Respect and Tolerance</b></p>	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What is religion and what does freedom of religion mean?</b></p> <p>Use SACRE 'Worldviews Introductory Lesson for KS1. Ask pupils what they think the words 'religion', 'freedom', and 'rights' mean.</p> <p>Explain a religion is an example of an organised worldview. Often have rituals, important places/people, stories etc. Can pupils name any religions? Create mind map to share and make links within prior knowledge.</p>	<p>Ceremony, religion, buildings, festival, belong, belief ritual, worship.</p>

2	<p>I can reflect on which ceremonies are important to me.</p> <p><b>Respect and Tolerance</b></p>	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>Which ceremonies are important in your family and community?</b></p> <p>What is a school assembly? Why do we have these? They show we belong together. We also have extra assemblies such as a celebrations and/end of/start of the year assemblies. Are assemblies important to you? The school community? Why? Explain assembly/collective worship as a form of ceremony for the school community - what are the recognisable features? Place artefacts and photos around the room related to ceremonies and ask children to move and discuss them.</p> <p>Watch BBC clip on Bat Mitzvah - A personal experience of a ceremony as part of someones individual worldview.</p> <p>Pupils to complete a reflection sheet about a ceremony which is important to them. (see SACRE resources).</p>	
3	<p>I can explain what happens at a wedding.</p> <p><b>Respect and Tolerance</b></p>	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What happens at a wedding and why?</b></p> <p>Display some images from weddings. Do you notice similarities and differences in the images? Ask children what a wedding is? A wedding is a</p>	

		<p>ceremony where two people are united in marriage and make vows of commitment to each other.</p> <p>Watch CBeebies video on weddings as an introduction.</p> <p>Discuss Christian wedding and Jewish wedding.</p> <p>Invite children to discuss their own experiences of a wedding they have been to.</p>

4	<p>I can explain what a naming ceremony is.</p> <p><b>Respect and Tolerance</b></p>	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What is a naming ceremony?</b></p> <p>The arrival of a baby is often a significant time for many families. Lots of organised worldviews have ceremonies to welcome and celebrate babies and many with individual worldviews will choose to craft a ceremony or special event to mark this their own way. Some of these ceremonies are linked to organised worldviews such as religious traditions, e.g. Christian baptism.</p> <p><u>Humanism is an example of an organised worldview that is non-religious.</u> Humanists believe it is possible to live a good and fulfilling life without following a traditional religion.</p> <p>Watch video on welcoming baby in the Humanist tradition. What is happening at the naming ceremony? Why do you think humanists might want to have a naming ceremony for their baby?</p>	

5	I can explain what worship is.	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What is worship?</b></p> <p>Explain that worship is an important thing that faith communities often gather together to do as a group.</p> <p>Explain 'worship' in simple terms: Worship is like a special way of showing love, respect, and gratitude to someone or something that is very important to humans. Can do done in different ways - going to places of worship.</p> <p>Give children examples of places of worship - simple matching game.</p>	
6	I can explain why Vaisakhi and Gurburab are important to the Sikhi religion.	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What is Vaisakhi and Gurburab?</b></p> <p>Reflect on children's prior knowledge of the Sikhi religion. Like other worldviews and religions there are celebrations and festivals which are important to the religion. Watch a video/ask a visitor to share their experiences about Sikhi, Vaisakhi and Gurburab.</p> <p>Show the 5ks, important symbols for Khalsa - affiliated Sikhs, not all Sikhs are Khalsa affiliated.</p>	

		<p>Discuss Gurburab - this is when the birthdays of the Gurus from the Sikh tradition are celebrated. Can children name any other times the birthday of a significant figure is celebrated (Christmas etc). Why might believers choose to celebrate the birthdays of these important people? Share BBC teach video and discuss significance of Guru Nanak to Sikhs and why they may therefore celebrate Guru Nanak's birthday.</p>	
7	<p>I can explain why Chanukah and Pesach are important to the Jewish religion.</p>	<p>Warwickshire Agreed Syllabus - How do people with similar religion or worldviews share and celebrate beliefs?</p> <p><b>What are Chunukah and Pesach?</b></p> <p>Light a candle and discuss what candles can be used for. When is a candle often used? When might lighting a candle bring comfort and joy? Mind map of flipchart the purpose of candles (birthdays candles, source of light, fragrance, remembering etc.)</p> <p>Watch SACRE video of Jewish representative talking about celebrating Chanukah. Chanukah is a festival of light and happens for 8 days in December. How is this festival celebrated? Which objects are used? What do believers do together to show they belong and to feel like they belong? BBC teach video for more information.</p> <p>Pesach is another Jewish celebration - often called 'Passover'. Jewish people remember of the story of Exodus and how their ancestors were led out of Egypt by Moses, where they were slaves.</p>
